Grammar: Reported speech



Direct speech is the speaker's exact words. Reported speech is a restatement of the speaker's words.

Direct speech	Reported speech
"I'm in Venezuela," she said.	She said (that) she was in Venezuela.
She said, "I'm visiting my family."	She said (that) she was visiting her family.
She said, "Caracas is beautiful."	*She said (that) Caracas is beautiful.

When the reporting verb (say, explain, tell, etc.) is in the past tense, it is common to change the verb tense in the that clause. This helps us to understand the order of events.

*When the speaker wants to be clear that the information is a general truth or still relevant for the present, tense changes aren't needed, the verb can stay in the present.

• "I don't feel well," said Jon. Jon said he didn't feel well. (simple present → simple past)

• "I'll call tonight," Ann said. Ann said she would call tonight. (will → would)

• "I can't go," said Ben. Ben said he couldn't go. (can → could)

• "She left at ten," Tom said. Tom said she had left at ten. (simple past → past perfect)

• "It's a great movie," Bo said. Bo said it's a great movie. (simple present → simple present)





Grammar: Reported speech



The verb *tell* must be followed by an object (noun or pronoun). The verb *say* is not followed by an object.

- She **told** me that she liked Bangkok. (She told that she liked Bangkok.)
- She **said** that she was happy. (She said me that she was happy.)

When we report someone's question, we use statement word order.

Direct speech	Reported speech
"Are you interested in politics?"	He asked her if she was interested in politics.
"Do you believe that article?"	She asked me if I believed that article.
"Where are you?"	They asked her where she was .
"When did you start to write?"	We asked him when he had started to write.
"What time are they coming back?"	I asked you what time they were coming back.





Reading technique: Structure-Proposition-Evaluation Reading?



What is Structure-Proposition-Evaluation Reading?

Iris Reading (2022) stated that the Structure-Proposition-Evaluation Reading is an excellent reading technique for non-fiction, often called the SPE technique. It involves three steps.


- Find the structure of the text. This is simply studying the layout of the text. You can do this by looking at the table of contents or the headings and subheadings in the text.
- Find the author-made propositions. In each section of the text, find the logical relationships between the author's propositions. That is, determine how the statements relate to one another.
- Evaluate the final arguments and conclusions. Look at the text's conclusions and determine whether the statements of the texts actually lead to that conclusion.
