






Character




Setting

The setting refers to the time, the geographical locations, and the general environment and circumstances that prevail in a narrative







PLOT ELEMENTS

The **plot** of a story is the series of events that make up a story.

There are <u>five</u> plot elements in a story.

Climax:

- the turning point of the story
- usually the most exciting or surprising part of the story

Rising Action:

- the main parts of the story which includes the problem
- Usually set up as 3 – 4 main events

-alling Action

 the events that follow the climax
 leads to the resolution

Exposition:


- · occurs at the beginning
- introduces the main character, setting, and basic situation needed to understand the story


Resolution

 the end of the story where all the loose ends are tied up


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




Themes

The theme in children's books should be worthy of children's attention and convey truth to them








There are advantages to studying literary theory there are several benefits

- 1. To affirm the perspective and speak to what to see in the literature you study.
- 2. Studying a view different from the reader's perspective—not to disagree with it, but to understand it—helps you understand those who hold that view.
- 3. Studying a work from more than one view gives the reader a deeper understanding of the author's work and a better appreciation for its richness.




Scholars review

Reading and writing seem inseparable, like two sides of the same coin. Sometimes we even say the three words as if they were only one: reading and writing. Their connections are echoed in the advice every successful writer gives fledgling ones to "read, read, read." Barnet (2008, p.2)



Chambers (2006, pp.69-72) points out that literary theory provides the directions for an interpretative approach to the text.







Thus, if the reader wants to improve critical thinking while reading, literary theory can systematically guide the reader to understand the deep meaning hidden in the text.




